When parents feel they have helped their children experience a more nurturing home environment in spite of their poverty or know they have resisted taking a path that will only provide more heartache, it empowers them to keep

working to become better parents and better members of their community.

From high school classes to businesses, Girl and Boy Scout Troops to book club members, grandparents to bachelors, and even former families, those who have adopted families or given donations in the past are as diverse and unique as the families for whom they have shopped. # A Home of Our Own:

## FSN Hopes to Expand into a New Building and Provide More Services

FSN is looking to find a home of our own. During the course of working with families, Barbara Sample, Executive Director is always on the lookout for ways to improve our program. The vision for our new home involves creating a family center that will house all of our services together. The housing center will include an area for our offices, a licensed daycare, transitional housing units, and provide home settings for supervised visitation.

Three issues started the vision to expand into a home setting. First, our families have limited choices in daycare when they need to apply for TANF, make doctor's appointments or apply for jobs. State daycare does not pay for drop in care so parents are often forced to leave their children with inappropriate individuals. By providing a daycare on site, we can model appropriate parenting (discipline, nutrition, play) with our parents who will serve as aides to earn daycare credits. Second, doing supervised visitation in one small room doesn't create an environment to observe and teach parents skills they need like preparing nutritious meals, napping, time out and a score of other basic parenting issues often needing to be done all at the same time. Third, many of our parents are ready to have their children returned but lack appropriate housing. This often leads to significant delays that are harmful to the children. During the critical transition time when the children are first returned, parents will literally have support right next door.

We believe parents will learn skills needed more quickly, children will spend less time in foster care and our recidivism rate will decrease further. (After a federal case audit, with a five year look back, FSN showed 83% of our closed families had



not reentered the Child Protective Services database vs. 40% of those families who did not receive our services).

Join with us to make this vision a reality. Cash contributions to the capital project can be mailed to Family Support Network, P. O. Box 21366, Billings, MT., 59104. We also need help from contractors to take the building and remodel it into the various working segments, local businesses for building materials and household items, and teams to put it all together. The staff of Family Support Network will continue to pursue grants that will help defray the costs to help the family center become a valued addition to our community. After her year at FSN, Erin worked in Missoula before returning to the East Coast. She is currently working on her PH.D. in American Studies at Harvard University.

family would yield more gifts than they could ever use, and Erin's positive experience made FSN their natural choice.
